Local Government uses for Census data

- **Local Government Finance** funding formula targets needy sections of the population using census data as measure
- **In depth analysis for policy formulation** (geography or topic), e.g. place-shaping
- **Planning Services**
- Basis for local **demographic estimates and projections**
- **Recalibrating – using census as benchmark** (household/dwelling count – in 2011 can check against LLPG, but not existing in 2001)
- **Area Profiles** for various local geographies, e.g.:
 - District Housing Office areas
 - Social Services areas
 - Neighbourhood Renewal Fund areas ... *and many more!*
- **Long-term trends** across censuses, e.g.
 - Lone parents
 - Economic activity
 - Commuting patterns
 - Household structure
 - Tenure ... *and across the range of Census topics!*
- **Funding bids:**
 - For local authorities to central government
 - For individual projects to Council or Government departments
- **Business plans:**
 - Banks/schemes will ask businesses to present plans that include potential customer profiles and locations.
- **National/Regional rankings**, e.g. Camden:
 - Highest proportion of resident full-time adult students in London
 - Ranked 2nd of LAs on overcrowding indicator
 - Ranked 3rd of LAs for % population Bangladeshi ... etc.
- **Provide information** to public, students, visitors etc.
